Additional Notes:

- Only one 1000 level ANT course may count towards the major, and would count as an elective.
- Students may not enroll in a course as a CAPSTONE if they have already taken the parallel course.
- Summer Cultural Anthropology field schools offered through the department are also excellent options for elective courses, and may in some cases also substitute for ANT 3410.
- This major requires a multidisciplinary concentration, with courses taken across at least three different departments (including anthropology). The concentration courses must be approved by advisor and department Chair.
- A contract with a list of the approved Concentration Area courses MUST be filed with the College of Arts & Sciences Dean’s Office no later than the end of the first semester of junior year.
- Study abroad is strongly encouraged and the program of study outlined here can be adjusted to accommodate study abroad in any semester.
- Foreign Language is optional, but strongly recommended. Advanced courses may count towards concentration if advisor concurs.
- Minor is optional. Concentration credits may also count towards minor.
- Departmental Honors: any course may be contracted as an HONORS course if the instructor agrees and the course is suitable; HONORS research and thesis courses can fill the “open courses” at the Senior level.
- Residency Requirements:
 - 31 hours must be from ASU
 - 18 hours in the major must be from ASU
 - 9 hours in the minor must be from ASU
