Additional Notes:

- This concentration requires an Internship (ANT 4900) to be arranged in consultation with adviser.
- Minor is optional but could fit in if student minors in Global Studies, Geography, SD or others that overlap with this program of study.
- Foreign language is optional but recommended. Foreign language classes can be taken in summer semesters and can count for some General Education Perspectives.
- Study abroad is strongly encouraged and the program of study outlined here can be adjusted to accommodate study abroad in any semester.
- Summer Anthropology field schools offered through the department are also excellent options for elective courses, area courses, and may in some cases also substitute for ANT 3410.
- Only one 1000 level ANT course may count towards the major, and would count as an elective.
- Departmental Honors: any course may be contracted as an HONORS course if the instructor agrees and the course is suitable; HONORS research and thesis courses can fill the "open" and "elective" courses at the Senior level.
- This concentration has in some ways been made redundant due to the new major in Sustainable Development in the College of Fine and Applied Arts. Therefore, Anthropology will no longer offer this concentration to students entering 2014-15, but will offer a new one that is more anthropology-focused called Sustainability and Social Practice. Interested students should inquire with the Department Chair.
- Residency Requirements:
 - o 31 hours must be from ASU
 - 18 hours in the major must be from ASU
 - 9 hours in the minor must be from ASU
